Architecture – Dream big or small?

Vocabulary	
Architecture	The design of structures or buildings such as houses, places of worship, schools and offices. Architecture can be about small designs such as a garage or large designs such as a whole city.
Architect	A person who designs buildings and in many cases also supervises their construction.
Sculpture	An artistic form in which materials are worked into three-dimensional art objects
Three-dimensional (3D)	Having or appearing to have length, width and depth.
Form	Form is three dimensional shapes such as cubes, spheres or cones. Sculpture is the art of creating 3D forms.
Innovative	Introducing new ideas, original and creative in thinking.
Environmental impact	Changes in the natural or built environment, resulting directly from an activity, that can have negative effects on the air, land, water, fish, and wildlife or the inhabitants of the ecosystem.
Sustainability	The idea that humans must interact with the environment in a way that ensures there will be enough resources left for future generations.

Dame Zaha Hadid – (1950 – 2016):

Zaha Hadid is British and one of the world's most famous female architects, being the first woman to win the Royal Institute of British Architects' (RIBA) Gold Medal in 2016. She has been called 'Queen of the Curve' in reference to her fantastic curvy designs on some famous buildings, including the London Aquatics Centre, pushing the boundaries for architecture itself and leading the way for women in the field.

Tiny Homes:

Tiny houses are small, fully-equipped living spaces that are designed as the centrepiece of a more sustainable lifestyle. Although they vary in size and shape, they tend to be between 15 and 50 square metres in capacity. They're made of sustainable materials and are easier — and cheaper — to maintain than traditional brick homes.
